Attleborough Community & Enterprise Centre involved refurbishment of an existing 16th Century timber-framed building, demolition of outbuildings and the construction of a new extension to the rear to provide an up to date inclusive facility fitted with the latest technology.

The new building is a prominent "gateway" to Attleborough within a Conservation Area opposite the church. Planning requirements necessitated archaeological monitoring and historic building recording throughout the demolition, excavation works and structural repair to the existing building.

A crèche with specialist crafts rooms and meeting/teaching rooms and separate access has been created in the existing building and the new two-storey extension provides accommodation - a new entrance and reception area, conference halls, offices, IT suite, internet café, kitchen and toilet facilities.

Although of modern construction, the extension complements the existing building incorporating a brick and render façade, clay pantile roof and large areas of glazing. The configuration provides a central courtyard and secure play area for the crèche enabling more car parking to be provided.

Sustainable and careful design incorporating solar panels, low energy lighting, high efficiency gas boilers, natural ventilation and rainwater storage has enabled the building to achieve a BREEAM rating of Very Good.







Procured under NCCs Partnering Framework, the Centre acts as a local learning hub for business, creating opportunities to boost income generation and enterprise around Attleborough providing a venue for meetings, training and presentations where three conference rooms combine into one, for bigger events. There's also a "comfy" classroom for informal meetings and additional rooms for syndicate use.



The Adult Education Service works closely with Attleborough High School, and the Centre offers network training to both individuals and businesses.
